REPLY COMMENTS OF
PROMETHEUS RADIO PROJECT AND
NATIONAL FEDERATION OF COMMUNITY BROADCASTERS

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August 11, 2009

SUMMARY

Prometheus Radio Project (“Prometheus”) and National Federation of Community Broadcasters (“NFCB”) commend the Commission for taking an important step to modify its licensing and modification policies to ensure that the public interest is being served. Despite the assertion of some Commenters that Commission action will harm diversity, localism, and the efficient use of spectrum, Commission action is needed to ensure that overlooked communities are provided with local transmission service.

Commenters objecting to action by the Commission express displeasure because they argue they will be unable to locate stations in communities that will maximize revenue. However, the Commission’s proposals would not prohibit station moves or allocations of licenses in urban areas. Rather, the Commission has taken steps to ensure that such moves will not be favored unless a specified community is worthy of a preference. Moreover a licensee may still rebut the new presumption against the preference.

Nor should the Commission be misled by the assertion that any modification to its rules and policies will somehow harm localism, diversity, or the efficient use of spectrum. The Commission has correctly focused on the need of a community – no matter the size – to have an outlet for local self-expression. The ability to serve as an outlet for the community of license is not exclusive of the ability to serve the larger listening audience, and the Commission should not proceed on that premise. In other words, a licensee should be capable of serving the entire listening area, while also providing programming relevant to the community of license.

A number of Commenters also attempt to suggest that any action by the Commission will be harmful to diversity and the ability of new entrants to enter a market. Prometheus and NFCB have consistently been, in this and other proceedings before the Commission, strong advocates of promoting policies that allow new voices – especially those of minorities and females – access to

the airwaves. However, a number of commenters define “diversity” and “new entrants” by claiming that these objectives are met when one incumbent broadcaster is able to compete in a market among other incumbent broadcasters. However, to truly increase the diversity of voices, the Commission should be adopting rules and policies that allow actual new entrants (those that do not already hold a license) - including minority and female applicants - to access the airwaves, instead of continuing to reward incumbent broadcasters. Also deceptive is the notion that Commission action will lead to an inefficient use of spectrum. This claim fails to recognize that it is not an inefficient use of the spectrum if an underserved community receives a superior and localized service.

Additionally, as the comments of Native Public Media and the National Congress of American Indians make clear, the Tribal Priority is much needed. Prometheus and NFCB maintain that not only is a Tribal Priority needed, but the Commission should act right away in facilitating that preference rather than wait to resolve all the issues in this proceeding.

Finally, Prometheus and NFCB ask that the Commission prohibit band-hopping by FM translators who participated in Auction 83 from the non-reserved band to the reserved band. The Commission’s two-year holding period does nothing to remedy the patent unfairness of allowing these licensees to jump to the head of the line for reserved-band spectrum. In the case that the Commission chooses not to prohibit band-hopping, Prometheus and NFCB would support a longer holding period and limitation on band-hopping which would require translators to be fed solely by an over-the-air signal.

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Media Access Project, on behalf of Prometheus Radio Project (“Prometheus”) and the National Federation of Community Broadcasters (“NFCB”), respectfully submits these Reply Comments in response to the Commission’s *Notice of Proposed Rulemaking* seeking comment on ways to ensure that the Commission’s statutory goal of distributing radio licenses is fair and equitable. *See In the Matter of Policies to Promote Rural Radio Service and to Streamline Allotment and Assignment Procedures (“NPRM”), 24 FCCRcd 5239 (2009).*

I. INTRODUCTION

In these Reply Comments, Prometheus and NFCB support the Commission’s initiation of this proceeding, in light of the current state of the radio service, to ensure that its rules and policies are promoting the public interest. Prometheus and NFCB maintain that this review of the current rules and policies, and changes to those policies, are necessary to promote diversity, localism, and “fair, efficient, and equitable” radio service.

In light of recent data and information, the Commission is correctly examining whether its policies and rules serve communities that get the least or no service, which is the purpose of

the 307(b) preference. Prometheus and NFCB agree with other Commenters that radio is a mature service, even within many rural areas. However, the current policies are actually working to thwart the traditional goals of Section 307(b), which is to ensure that all parts of the country, not just urban areas, receive radio service. Further, the Commission must also consider other statutory obligations along with the geographic distribution of services to provide “fair, efficient, and equitable” service. In initial comments, Prometheus and NFCB have suggested that the Commission assume that a licensee is likely to seek the largest audiences within its reach. The old assumptions regarding service to communities of licenses are no longer adequate since licensees have virtually no specific, Commission-enforced, obligations to serve their communities of license. The Commission is well within its authority to consider whether its policies advance the Commission’s mandate to promote diversity and localism, as well as the “fair, efficient, and equitable” distribution of services.

In these Reply Comments, Prometheus and NFCB maintain that the current scheme for allotting a Section 307(b) preference is a threat to localism, diversity, and a “fair, efficient, and equitable” use of the spectrum. Prometheus and NFCB also continue to urge the Commission to promptly adopt a tribal preference. Finally, Prometheus and NFCB encourage the Commission to prohibit band-hopping, or at a minimum, limit band-hopping to translators fed solely by over-the-air signal.

II. THE COMMISSION MUST REVISE ITS POLICIES TO FULFILL ITS STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS.

Based on comments filed in this proceeding, it is apparent the Commission must be clear as to its responsibility in fulfilling the goals of Section 307(b), diversity, and localism. Some Commenters suggest that since stations inevitably serve an area beyond the community of license (“COL”), the Commission should not be concerned with whether the station intends to

serve the COL that it claims in order to win the Section 307(b) preference. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Educational Media Foundation, Comments of Radio One, *et al.* (“Joint Parties”); and Comments of Miller Communications, Inc., *et al.* However, while it is true that a station’s signal reaches beyond the community of license (“COL”), there is no reason the Commission should accept the premise that while serving the entire listening audience, a station should receive a preference based on behavior that has not, in fact, materialized—namely specialized service to the community of license. Moreover, the fact that a station in a community will reach an audience beyond the designated COL justifies the Commission’s review of its policies to ensure that any preference granted to a licensee based on its designated COL is because the COL is actually being served by the licensee, rather than the community simply being exploited to reach a different and larger community.

Under Section 307(b) as it is currently implemented, the Commission favors proposals to create a local *transmission* service for identified communities. The Commission has determined this to mean providing a community, no matter the size, an outlet for “local self-expression.” *NPRM*, 24 FCCRcd at 5244. The supposed benefit of a community having its own transmission service is that the community has a local outlet and local voice to serve the community’s needs. The current policies are not promoting these objectives. As outlined in more detail below, no licensee should receive a preference for service they are not performing and are not required to perform. Instead, some parties claim that the current process needs no modification and instead claim the Commission is violating the Administrative Procedure Act (“APA”) and attempting to return to outdated policies. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Joint Parties at 2-11.

A. The Commission's NPRM Does Not Attempt To Reinstate Past Reallocation Policies.

Joint Parties fault the Commission's proposal as one attempting to reinstate the reallocation policies that were eliminated by the Commission. *See* Comments of Joint Parties at 2-3. Specifically, Joint Parties believe the Commission is attempting to resurrect the *Suburban Community Policy*, the *Berwick Doctrine*, and the *De Facto Reallocation Policy* (collectively referred to as "reallocation policies"). However, these policies, and the repeal of these policies, were based on an examination of the radio industry in 1983 and are irrelevant to the current proceeding and current circumstances. Instead, the Commission is following through on its duty and obligation to review its policies that may be harmful to the public interest.

The current policies assume a COL will receive preferential service deserving of a statutory preference. However, in this new proceeding, the Commission has recognized that basing a preference between mutually exclusive applications simply on "differences in populations receiving new service...may be inconsistent with statutory and policy goals." *NPRM*, 24 FCCRcd at 5244. Additionally, in the context of change in community of license ("CCOL") applications, the Commission noted that "[b]ased on our experience with such proposals, we believe that certain modifications or clarifications in these standards may be warranted. Additionally, we wish to address the comments of certain parties in other proceedings who are concerned about the loss of radio service to smaller and more rural communities." *NPRM*, 24 FCCRcd at 5246-5247. Thus, based on its recent experience with the radio service, the Commission has chosen to review and seek comment on the effectiveness of its policies to promote the public interest.

Further, in eliminating the reallocation policies, the Commission expected that existing obligations would retain meaningful service to the COL, despite a reduction in the Commission's

review of licensees serving smaller communities adjacent to larger communities. Specifically, the Commission said that the designated community of license would benefit from a “main studio in that community, ... [a] requisite signal over the community, ... [and] a programming proposal to meet the needs and interests of the smaller community.” Report and Order, *In the Matter of the Suburban Community Policy, the Berwick Doctrine, and the De Facto Reallocation Policy* (“*Reallocation Policy Order*”), 93 FCC2d 436, 447 (1983). The Commission expected and understood that in addition to providing service to the community of license, the station could “*also compete[] in the larger metropolitan area that includes the community of license.*” *Id.* (emphasis added).

Moreover, in repealing the reallocation policies, the Commission did not expect to abdicate its responsibility to ensure service to the designated community and expected that other safeguards would ensure that the station was providing service to the community of license. *See Reallocation Policy Order*, 93 FCC2d at 451. Thus, the Commission expected compliance with the licensing renewal rules which would promote service to the COL. *Id.* However, the premise that a license renewal would address these issues no longer exists since the current license renewal process is much different than it was in 1983. During that time, the license renewal application process was much more detailed and allowed for more scrutiny than the rubber stamp renewal currently in existence.

Importantly, the Commission based its determination in 1983 on certain expectations, which have not materialized, regarding the behavior of radio licensees. Specifically, the Commission assumed that the maturity of the radio industry meant a radio station may have a strong economic incentive to serve smaller communities or niche communities within larger communities. *See Reallocation Policy Order*, 93 FCC2d at 451. Instead, the behavior of radio

stations in recent years has demonstrated an inexorable movement toward urban areas and an abandonment of smaller communities. It is possible that, for a time, economic incentives were indeed as the Commission posited in 1983. However, the Commission's own observations about licensee behavior, in addition to data submitted in this record, justify the need for this proceeding and a new analysis.

B. Recent Circumstances Support the Commission's Initiation of an NPRM and Is Not In Violation of the APA.

Some parties also accuse the Commission of violating the APA and attempting to return to outdated policies. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Joint Parties at 2-11. Joint Parties reprimand the Commission for failing "to distinguish or even discuss past policy decisions nor examine any relevant data" or provide an "explanation for changing the policy" at this time. Comments of Joint Parties at 9; *see also*, Comments of Media Technology Ventures, LLC at 9-11. However, the Commission is entitled to initiate a proceeding on its own motion, at any time, to review and adopt rules and policies that will further its statutory goals, especially in light of new and different circumstances. Moreover, the context and purpose of this current proceeding is much different than the proceedings regarding the reallocation policies.

With respect to community of license changes, prior to 1983, when the reallocation policies were abolished, there appears to be no evidence that a substantial record existed with respect to the abuse in the CCOL application process. However, the Commission's decision in January 2007 to streamline the CCOL process has offered a great deal of data which has raised concerns for the Commission as to whether the goals of §307(b) are being served. Detailed reports from both Prometheus and William Clay in this and other proceedings strongly suggest that this preference has been effectively manipulated to allow broadcasters to enter large population centers. For example, the fact that no applicant, who claimed first local service in the

CCOL application, actually has a studio located within their COL is evidence that this abuse is widespread.

Moreover, pursuant to the APA, the Commission is entitled to initiate a proceeding – so long as it accepts public comment - to ensure that its rules and policies are serving the public interest. The requirement of notice and fair opportunity to comment is a basic tenet of administrative law. It promotes public participation in the administrative process and ensures informed agency decision-making. The APA requires that the Commission’s notice include “either the terms or substance of the proposed rule” or “a description of the subjects and issues involved.” 5 U.S.C. §553(b)(3). The Commission’s NPRM does exactly that; Joint Parties’ assertion that the Commission lacks a factual basis for its proposals is simply misguided since the purpose for the rulemaking is to create a factual record.

III. THE COMMISSION’S PROPOSAL WILL NOT BE A HINDERANCE TO DIVERSITY.

Some Commenters claim that the Commission’s proposal will harm diversity. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Joint Parties at 11-20 and Comments of National Association of Broadcasters at 3. While it may be true that some female and minority owners have benefited from the current structure, many large corporate chains that do not reflect diverse ownership also would be in a position to gain by the current structure. This would by and large reproduce the existing ownership structure and demographic of current incumbent broadcasters.

Moreover, while these parties attempt to justify their opposition based on efficiency and diversity, they fail to address the threshold issue of the tension between the special preferences granted to a licensee proposing to serve a smaller, rural community and the economic incentives which induce a station to serve the largest metropolitan areas. In fact, the opposition of some parties is grounded in just this financial reality. They oppose the current review of the

Commission's policies because it will limit their abilities to make changes that will enable them to earn increased revenue by serving larger metropolitan areas, but at the same time seek to retain a preference based on the understanding that special service will be offered to smaller communities.

To truly increase the diversity of voices, the Commission should be adopting rules and policies that allow new entrants - including minority and female applicants - to access the airwaves, instead of continuing to reward incumbent broadcasters. The current policy is hurting low power radio ("LPFM") stations which play an important role in advancing broadcast diversity. When the LPFM service was created, the Commission noted that "[o]ne of the most important purposes of establishing [the LPFM] service [was] to...expand diversity of ownership." Report and Order, *In the Matter of Creation of Low Power Radio Service*, 15 FCCRcd 2206, 2216-17 (2000). To truly expand diversity of ownership, the Commission must continue to prioritize licensing new entrants such as LPFM licensees, rather than to only accommodate incumbents. Indeed, it does not appear that any commenter has characterized "diversity" or "new entrants" to mean the inclusion of *new* minority and female voices. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Joint Parties at 16; Comments of National Association of Broadcasters at 3. Instead, the terms "new entrants" and "diversity" reflect the desire to allow different incumbents to enter the market among other incumbents in a market.

In countless proceedings, Prometheus and NFCB have consistently supported and urged efforts by the Commission to promote and increase minority and female ownership among broadcast stations. All parties agree on the problem, but disagree on whether the current policy is an appropriate solution. Prometheus and NFCB believe that other Commission efforts to promote diversity directly are more appropriate vehicles than continuing the current Section

307(b) preference which was supposed to support service to rural areas and is now, in fact, thwarting that goal. For example, the Commission has recently convened the Federal Advisory Committee on Diversity for Communications in the Digital Age. *See* Federal Communications Commission News, *Acting Chairman Copps Announces Membership and Initial Meeting of Federal Advisory Committee on Diversity for Communications in the Digital Age* (rel. April 22, 2009). The Committee’s “mission is to make recommendations to the [Commission] regarding policies and practices that will further enhance the ability of minorities and women to participate in telecommunications and related industries.” *Id.* This new effort, as well as the on-going media ownership dockets, seems to be the appropriate vehicles to ensure diversity in the broadcast market.

Prometheus and NFCB agree that no proposal in this proceeding should inhibit minorities or females to own radio stations in or move their stations to communities that will allow them to serve their audience. However, licensees should not be relieved of localism requirements, *i.e.*, the responsibility to provide programming relevant to the designated COL. As recognized by the reallocation policies, while a licensee inevitably serves a market beyond the COL, the licensee still has a responsibility to serve the designated community of license.

IV. MODIFICATION OF SECTION 307(B) PRIORITIES WILL PROMOTE LOCALISM AND EFFICIENT USE OF THE PUBLIC SPECTRUM.

Prometheus and NFCB agree with other Commenters that radio service is a mature service, even within many rural areas. For this reason, in granting licenses, the Commission must consider other statutory obligations in tandem with its obligation to provide “fair, efficient, and equitable” service. Thus, as demonstrated in initial comments, Prometheus and NFCB have advanced new metrics for “fair, efficient, and equitable” service, which includes new measures

of localism to better examine how to actually provide a community with an outlet for local self-expression.

Nonetheless, some Commenters suggest that the Commission's proposals will be of no benefit to localism (and diversity). For example, Joint Parties point to an analysis to advocate that "every station move produces the opportunity for other stations to improve their facilities or relocate and thereby provide new service to outlying or rural area." Comments of Joint Parties at 17; *see also*, Comments of Educational Media Foundation 4-5. However, what these parties fail to note is that a community losing its local transmission service can effectively be precluded from replacing the transmission service in their community due to subsequent modifications of other stations or because the licensee that moves typically continues to cover the old community of license with a signal.

As a consequence, mid-sized communities located near metropolitan areas that might have been able to financially support a commercial radio station have no spectrum available. Instead, the vacant spectrum that results is located in an even less populated area where there is a much smaller likelihood of a commercially successful station. The analysis of the Joint Parties fails to provide any data regarding replacement of a lost service. Thus, while it is apparent that a facility move will open up spectrum *somewhere*, generally farther out, the Commission should also be concerned whether the losing community has the chance to replace the transmission service and the programming origination that it lost and whether the ultimately vacated spectrum is located where a commercial service can be financially viable.

Additionally, some Commenters argue that revision of the Commission's policies will result in an inefficient use of spectrum. *See, e.g.*, Comments of Joint Parties at 16-20. However, it is not an inefficient use of the spectrum if a somewhat smaller group of otherwise underserved

people receive a superior and localized service. Moreover, while full-power stations may face some constraints, there continues to be a demand and supply for smaller range broadcasting purposes. Indeed, the small broadcasting range greatly reduces the capital needed to start and maintain a radio station, allowing new entrants a chance to enter broadcasting. In fact, the success of LPFM suggests that a smaller broadcasting range can enable more local, catered programming and accessible advertising.

For example, KPCN-LP, a low power radio station in Oregon, provides programming all day (everyday) to thousands of Latinos in a ten-mile radius around their COL, Woodburn. The station includes the voice of local youth, indigenous people (speaking in their own languages), women, workers, and progressive leaders from Latino communities around the corner and around Latin America. Another low power radio station, WRFN-LP in Nashville, TN offers underwriting to local businesses at a very low rate: \$240 gives you forty-eight mentions, during prime time. In Sacramento, the Black Chamber of Commerce owns an LPFM station, KDEE-LP, offering 24 underwriting mentions for \$360.

However, instead of the first local service preference facilitating the formation of these small stations, designed specifically to fulfill the need of an underserved community, it is this preference that is threatening the very existence of these small stations. In fact, since January 2007, over 450 low power radio stations have faced some form of encroachment by a full-power station taking advantage of the Commission's new streamlined procedure for a change in community of license.¹ *See* Attachment A. These stations have been able to remain on the air only through the use of a Special Temporary Authority on a different frequency, a precarious

¹ In fact, each of the LPFM stations given as an example above has faced some form of encroachment.

situation in which the station accepts that they might be ordered to turn off their transmitter at any moment. The more common scenario regarding full power encroachment does not mandate that the LPFM station move its frequency. Rather, their main signal area - already small due to the low power of LPFM stations - is significantly degraded due to these move-ins.

V. THE COMMISSION SHOULD ADOPT A TRIBAL PREFERENCE.

Prometheus and NFCB support the comments of Native Public Media (“NPM”) and the National Congress of American Indians (“NCAI”), urging the adoption of a Tribal Priority. As NPM and NCAI have noted, adoption of a Tribal Priority is constitutionally sound and any objections to this preference are not supported by precedent. As discussed at greater length in the comments submitted by NPM and NCAI, a Tribal Priority does not rely on racial or ethnic identification, but rests on the inherent sovereignty of Indian Tribes, as well as the responsibility of the federal government to honor its trust relationship with the Tribes as domestic dependent nations.

Prometheus and NFCB also support NPM’s and NCAI’s opposition to any limitation or modification to the Commission’s proposal. As the comments of NPM and NCAI make clear, the Tribal Priority is much needed. For that reason, Prometheus and NFCB again urge the Commission to immediately implement the Tribal Priority.

VI. THE COMMISSION SHOULD PROHIBIT BAND HOPPING BY TRANSLATORS.

The Commission has sought comment on whether applicants for commercial FM translators, who participated in Auction 83 in 2003, should be permitted to file a minor change to be able to move from the non-reserved band to the reserved band. *See NPRM*, 24 FCCRcd at 5255. A number of parties have filed identical comments on the Commission’s proposal. *See, e.g.,* Comments of Priority Radio, Inc.; Sacred Heart University, Inc.; Creative Educational

Media Corp.; Calvary Chapel of Twin Falls, Inc.; Positive Alternative Radio, Inc.; and Cameron University (collectively referred to as “Band Hop Supporters”). They uniformly suggest that the Commission adopt an alternative proposal limiting the opportunities to move from the non-reserved to the reserved band.²

Instead of placing these limitations, NFCB and Prometheus recommend that the Commission prohibit the practice, except when the primary station that feeds the translator must undergo some change warranting a corresponding change to the translator.³ Band hopping, as the Commission points out, “is patently unfair to those potential applicants that have waited for the opening of a reserved band FM translator window.” *NPRM*, 24 FCCRcd at 5255. Placing a holding period on such applicants does not remove the unfairness of allowing some applicants to jump to the head of the line. A two-year holding period, as proposed by the Commission, will

² Specifically, they propose that the Commission:

- (a) Place a special operating condition on all future new-station FM translator construction permits that would prohibit band-hopping modification applications unless granted a special waiver.
- (b) Band-hopping modification applications that are approved as a result of a waiver contain a special operating condition that require the Primary Station to feed the translator station solely by over-the-air signal, thereby negating the concern over application gamesmanship that might be intended to use alternative methods of signal delivery.
- (c) Place strict limits on the number of translator applications that may be filed by one party in any future FM translator filing windows; and,
- (d) Place a specific time holding period on the assignment or transfer of any construction permit or license acquired as a result of a future FM translator filing window.

³ Although a prohibition on band-hopping for translators should not, in itself, impact low power radio stations, NFCB and Prometheus believe that it should be clear that low power radio stations should be permitted to move into the reserved band if necessary when they are displaced. These are not translators, but actual stations originating their own programming, and are part of the NCE service.

likely be of little use when the relevant filing window occurred in 2003; many translators that were granted and constructed from that window may already meet the holding period. If a prohibition is not adopted, a longer holding period should be required.

Since the reserved band is already fairly crowded, the Commission should adopt policies that promote the highest use—namely localism and diversity. NFCB and Prometheus are concerned about expanding the number of licensees that can avail themselves of alternative methods of signal delivery, such as satellite-fed signals. Satellite-fed signals are typically used by licensees who offer little local origination. Thus, if the Commission does not prohibit band-hopping altogether, NFCB and Prometheus would support the proposal by the Band Hop Supporters to require such translators to be fed solely by over-the-air signal. If flexibility is needed, waivers of the Commission's rules are always available when the general rule is not appropriate.

VII. CONCLUSION

Prometheus and NFCB urge the Commission to adopt new policies and rules to promote localism, diversity, and efficient use of the spectrum. Prometheus and NFCB also continue to urge the Commission to promptly adopt a tribal preference. Finally, Prometheus and NFCB encourage the Commission to prohibit band-hopping, or at a minimum, limit band-hopping to translators fed solely by over-the-air signal.

For Co-Channel and first adjacent channels, the following advisories are given:

CITY GRADE - A City Grade encroachment is displayed if the 70 dBu City Grade contour of the full power FM station overlaps into the service contour of the LPFM station. This is legal interference under §73.809(a). LPFM stations should prepare for a possible complaint from the full power station and should start looking to make their next move.

MAJOR - A MAJOR encroachment is displayed if the 60 dBu protected service contours of both the full power and LPFM stations overlap. For non-commercial stations, this is considered interference per §73.809(a)(3). For commercial stations, §73.809(a)(1) and (2) state that interference in the full power station's city grade (70 dBu) or within the community of license is considered legal interference. For IF channels (+/- 10.6 and 10.8 MHz), MAJOR will also be displayed if the 91dBu contours of the full power and the LPFM station overlap. LPFMs receiving a MAJOR message should start immediately considering remedial action or preparing a demonstration on how the LPFM will not cause interference to the proposed full power facility. MAJOR does not mean the end of your station, but it means you need to do some serious thinking about your next move.

RED - A red encroachment means that the full power FM station's primary service contour has overlapped the interference contour of the LPFM. LPFM stations with a red encroachment on the co-channel or first adjacent channel could suffer significant interference and may receive interference complaints from the full power station.

ORANGE - Orange encroachment is displayed when the LPFM's interference overlaps into the buffer zone located 20 km beyond a full power station's protected contour. The FCC created the buffer zone to allow LPFM stations to stay on the air even if full power stations make short moves. While this operation may still be legal, the LPFM station may encounter more interference from the full power station resulting in a smaller coverage area. No new LPFM stations would be licensed in this area.

YELLOW - Yellow encroachment is displayed when the interference contour of the full power station overlaps with the LPFM's service contour. Yellow encroachment only displays on co-channel and higher powered first adjacent channel stations. Based on the full power station's location and the terrain between it and the LPFM, the LPFM may experience interference in the direction of the encroaching station.

On second and third adjacent channel situations, we will give one of the following messages:

Second/Third Adjacent Warning - The full power station's service contour has overlapped into the LPFM's interference contour. LPFMs may be required to resolve interference problems addressed in §73.810 if the full power station is on a third adjacent channel.

Second/Third Adjacent Advisory - The 20 km buffer zone around the full power station's protected service contour has overlapped the LPFM's second/third adjacent channel interference contour. Although unlikely the LPFM will receive interference complaints it is very possible that listeners with radios of poor design may not receive the station in fringe areas.
